I would like to share a personal story that highlights how environmental episodes can impact food security.

Although the waters have receded, for many in our city (some CSA members included), the recent flooding of the South Saskatchewan River has dramatically changed the lives of some people forever. For others, the impact was less significant, but still felt, even if only in an indirect way.

On Tuesday, July 2, I took my son out for supper to one of his favorite restaurants. He enjoys chicken from a local fried chicken establishment, so we stopped by for a bite to

eat. When I placed my order for a chicken sandwich the attendant promptly told me that my sandwich would come without lettuce because there was none available. This was due to the fact that the flood had impacted both of our city's major food wholesalers. WHAT! I thought to myself, the only component of this meal that resembles anything green and healthy was the lettuce, and it was unavailable?! As I sulked, and choked down my chicken sandwich, I pondered the irony of this situation. At home I had more lettuce growing than I knew what to do with, but here I sat with no lettuce to complete my meal. This made me question the security of our food system. It became obvious that both local and worldly events can have a significant impact on the availability of the food that we take for granted will always be there.
